## Pastor's Report

1987 has been a year of "good news" and "bad news" (aren't they all). On the last day of 1987 I recall the joys, responses, successes, and warmth of the year. Still, we are called by St. Paul to "press on toward the mark of Jesus Christ". We cannot change 1987, but we can only praise God for blessings and seek forgiveness for failures.

I praise the work of the Boards and Committees for faithfulness and diligence. The ministry of music has been outstanding. The Council, Trustees, and the Building Committee are addressing our urgent need for Sunday School and parking space. Two youth fellowships are active. The enlarged Diaconate has worked well and hard. The Stewardship and Missions Committee has been active for the first time in mission education, and the monetary results have been tremendous. The pledges to underwrite the 1988 budget have set a record in number and amount. We were saddened by the discontinuance of the Recycling Program due to economic reasons, but praise the faithful work of the Ways and Means Committee and the hard work of the Tuesday Workers for the Fall Fair. A Pictorial Directory will be available early in 1988. We continue to have visitors, new families, and reactivated members appearing at worship. There is great excitement about the new Sunday School curriculum and the faithful work of the teachers and staff. All of this is good news!

1988 will bring the 45th anniversary of the preaching of my first sermon in Medford, NJ (age 16). Many years and sermons have followed. I look back wondering where the time has gone, and look forward to the present and the future. As I have reread my two previous annual reports, I find the same unaddressed issues of increased membership while keeping the same attendance figures. Some things previously accomplished by individuals or groups are no longer happening. There seems to be a definite decline in joy and open communication in the pastoral/people relation.

Perhaps we have gone too far, too fast. I feel the West Stafford Church has a wonderful, unique role to play in our growing community. Still, this can be a frightening, threatening experience to a church characterized by a small, intimate relation. The sense of "ownership" by faithful people may bring about resentment as they are called to expand the intimate, caring circle. Things just aren't the same as they used to be. As pastor (from the word "shepherd") I am called to care for the entire "flock". This may be a source of disappointment or distress. Perhaps the intimate trust relationship of shepherd/flock has suffered because of calls to follow on new paths. Since nothing has been said openly, I can only guess at the reasons for change. I look forward to openness and honesty.

As Doris and I approach retirement, we would like to look forward to a joyous, fulfilling ministry among you. We must be united in a mutually accepted purpose. Prayerfully, we can enter 1988 with renewed commitment to the total church of Jesus Christ as expressed in West Stafford. As a shepherd, I will seek to lead to a deeper spiritual life, and new expressions of faith. I lift up before us this suggested purpose: TO KNOW CHRIST AND TO MAKE HIM KNOWN.

- 7. Initiating workdays on May 2nd and November 7th.
- 8. Hiring various contractors to make repairs to Church property.
- 9. Oversee lawn care and snow removal.
- 10. Overseeing of current budget.
- 11. Taking Church inventory and having Fine Arts appraised to current day values.
- 12. Handicap Parking signs.
- 13. Hiring of Traffic Control Constable.
- 14. Refinishing of Parsonage Bathtub.
- 15. Preparing Proposed Budget for 1988.

The May 2nd workday was a great success, with many members and friends participating, but the turnout on November 7th was disappointing. The sole purpose for these workday events is not to obtain free labor, but to promote fellowship and a sense of pride we have in our buildings and grounds.

As of January 1988, we say good-bye to Erik Abrahamson and Jack Richens. Their experience and wisdom has been greatly appreciated at Trustee Meetings over the past three years. A special thanks to Nancy Tripoli, our Trustee Secretary, for precise, typewritten monthly reports.

#### Delegates

October 16th thru 18th Sandra Soukup, Doris and Rev. Howard Cramer and myself attended the 180th Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ in Middletown, Connecticut. As your delegates we helped install the people who are only a telephone call away when we need their assistance.

During the course of the meeting the 1988 budget passed, after some lengthy debate. Also passed were four of the five resolutions. The resolution concerned the following issues: (a) Connecticut Conference Response to Economic Injustice in Connecticut; (b) Support of Deborah Home Inc., an Orphanage in Puerto Rico; (c) Care for the Homeless Poor; (d) Liberation Theology. The only non-adopted resolution concerned the following issue: Solidarity with the Third World and Support for a Third World Missioner. Both of the pronouncements that were brought before the conference were passed. They concerned the following issues: (a) Christian Civic Responsibility - Voting; and (b) Against Federal Undercutting of Charity.

Dr. Kahn spoke to us in his conference minister's address about, "Why We Gather As The Connecticut Conference". The following six purposes provide that basis:

- (1) Celebrating our life through worship
- (2) Reflecting theologically about our life and mission
- (3) Creating a sense of our common life in Christ
- (4) Setting visions and directions for mission
- (5) Proclaiming the Gospel to our world
- (6) Allocating the necessary resources for our ministries

National Synod reports were given. In major actions the Synod adopted a renewal of the Youth/Young Adult priority for two years, and The Homeless Poor as a new priority replacing Family Life for a four year period. (Peace and Justice and Spiritual Renewal continue.) A final decision on the national headquarters was delayed but locations were limited to New York, Cleveland or St. Louis. The Coordinating Center for Women was made a permanent agency.

Sister Miriam Therese Winter was our theological reflector. M.T., as she is better known on Sherman Street, is a highly gifted person and is the first theological reflector we had from the Roman Catholic Community. She is a brilliant song-writer and spiritual director. Her insights were very helpful.

Both Dr. Kahn and M.T. brought us into focus as what does the Lord require of you, But to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God.

We also represented our church at all three Tolland Association Meetings, plus five installations/ordination reviews and services. It is good fellowship to meet people from nearby churches.

#### Stewardship and Missions Committee

The Stewardship and Missions Committee met monthly with the goals of conducting a membership call, supporting special offerings, increasing mission awareness throughout the church, and, of course, the annual pledge drive.

The membership calling was completed and as reported in <u>Keeping In Touch</u>, members responded favorably to the way things are going. A majority of the members do not want to change the worship service schedule as outlined on the questionnaire.

Special offerings were conducted using the supporting literature supplied by the conference center.

Mission moments and the mission bulletin board were used to inform members on the important mission outreach our church supports. The April Planning Session revealed several members were interested in a stronger local missions outreach program and they have responded to our invitation to join with our committee. Through their effort we now have a strong food drive conducted on Communion Sunday with hopes of expanding the outreach next year.

The Annual Pledge Drive was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up. This year we received 69 pledges totalling \$26,629 for the local budget, \$5,828 for missions, and \$6,543 for the Building Fund. Overall, we are pleased with the result. The number of pledges increased and the total amount pledged increased.
